


Message From the Chair



Halliwick AST Publications—New CD

Halliwick AST has produced a number of publications over the years and one of the most popular has always been "Swimming Songs".

As this publication has 114 songs, it has become evident that not everybody knows every song or the tunes used. For this reason, it was felt that a CD should be made.

This necessitated 2 CDs and so the booklet has been updated (4TH edition) and reference given to the equivalent CD numbers. The CD number is in red next to the song title (i.e. 1:1, 1:2 etc. referring to the first CD and 2:1, 2:2 etc. for the second CD). Songs are sung, spoken or chanted. There are just 4 songs not recorded and some songs have 2 versions.

Halliwick has always aimed for balance and freedom of movement in the water and this may be achieved through the use of songs and music. The use of songs is a fun way for people to learn without being immediately aware that they are learning.

All songs and activities must have a purpose. The songs in this booklet are linked to the Halliwick 10-Point Programme and, although placed in various sections, some songs fit more than one category and/or can be adapted. The first verse of the song may be used initially but, as a swimmer becomes more competent, other verses may be added.

This publication is a 'must have' and, at £7 for the booklet and 2 CDs, is a good buy.

My Halliwick Story—Beryl Kelsey



I first heard of Halliwick when I was on an ASA disability teachers' course. On my return home, I contacted the association and was told 'sorry, no Halliwick in the North of England; all we can suggest is that you hire the film 'Water Free' and we are writing a book 'Swimming for Disabled People". So I paid my £2 affiliation fee (as it was back then) and waited for a few years. I was teaching swimming to patients from 3 learning disability hospitals and arranged a viewing of the film and resuscitation training for all the staff involved. With the Halliwick I had learned on the ASA course, and the knowledge gleaned from the 'Water Free', we were able to provide excellent sessions for our swimmers with widely varying needs.

Well, everything comes to those who wait and, eventually, we heard of a 2-day training course in London. It was really limited to Astra 1 club members, but Joan Martin was the organiser and allowed the 2

interlopers from Hull to attend, as well as letting us sleep on her living room floor. Wanting to extend my experience, we set up a Halliwick club, Hull Optimists. Sometime after the course, Joan and Alan Brown put the 2-day course on in Hull and I assisted. By this time I was getting a lot of experience lecturing for the ASA disability teaching awards and so, with Alan's help, I was soon lecturing for Halliwick AST.

A 2-day course followed, perhaps a year or more later, by another 2-day course (known as part A & B) was awkward for some attendees, so I presented all 4 days as 1 course. This attracted participants from overseas, leading to my being invited to present courses in other countries, 11 so far.

As well as lecturing and running a club and a region (Halliwick Astra 5), I have sat on virtually all the committees and also did a spell on the International Halliwick Association Executive Committee.

Able2 Success at Disability Sport Yorkshire Awards

Able2 Pontefract Special Olympics are celebrating after double success at this year's Disability Sport Yorkshire Awards held at the Centenary Pavilion Banqueting Suite, Leeds United FC on Friday 12th September. Wakefield-based charity Disability Sport Yorkshire held its twenty-first annual awards event recognising and celebrating the sporting achievements of people with disabilities from across Yorkshire. The special guest speakers at this year's event included three Paralympians: Australian swimmer Elizabeth Wright, archer Danielle Brown MBE and discus athlete Kevan Baker OBE. DSY received nominations from all over the region to recognize amazing sporting achievement for awards in twelve different categories ranging from Young Achiever to Sportswoman and Sportsman of the Year.

Able2 Pontefract Special Olympics were thrilled to see Sarah and Oliver named Sportswoman and Sportsman of 2014. Sarah competed in 16 swimming competitions in the last year, including 5 at national level and 3 European championships winning 10 gold, 14 silver and 14 bronze swimming medals. As a member of the GB Down Syndrome squad, Sarah competed in the Down Syndrome International Swimming Organisation (DSISO) European Championships in Portugal. There, Sarah won 3 gold medals and broke 4 World records and 5 European records for swimmers with Down Syndrome. Sarah was the most successful GB swimmer at the Championships.

Oliver is an all-round athlete who competes in 6 sports: swimming, athletics, equestrian (dressage), table tennis, boccia, new age kurling, Since January 2013, Oliver has taken part in over 30 competitions. He has competed in 12 competitions at national level in 5 different sports. The Awards compere, Roger Greenwood, said, "Oliver's medal tally of 39 gold 18 silver and 5 bronze reads more like the medal tally of a country at the Olympic games than an individual sportsman!"

We want to know what you think ...

For as long as we have been holding a national championship each year, swimmers winning their races have been presented with trophies. These trophies have been perpetual and as such, have been engraved each year. However, between championships, this has meant that the winning region has had to look after the trophy, making sure that it is in good condition and suitably engraved for the next year. This is expensive and also means that the region has the difficulty of ensuring that any trophies are kept safe and secure, essentially for a whole year, then having to collect all trophies for the following year's championship, which is in itself, very time-consuming.

It has been suggested that, in order to reduce cost and the burden on regions in future years, what we might do as an association is give the winners of each race at the national championships a smaller trophy which the region could then engrave and give to the swimmer to keep. This would reduce cost and would mean that the problem of keeping trophies safe and secure and in collecting trophies each year would be avoided.

A decision has not yet been made. **We want to know what you think**. Please email any comments to William at halliwickast.chair@gmail.com by 31st December 2014 so that a proposal can be put to the association's AGM on 26th April 2015.

In Loving Memory of Dinah Rosemary Cadogan MBE MCSP DipTP 4th January 1927– 2nd November 2014

(A Tribute From Keith Beer, Chair Halliwick ASTRA 15)



It was with great sadness and regret that I heard that the President of the Welsh Region of the Halliwick Association of Swimming Therapy and my dear friend and mentor, Dinah Cadogan, had passed away on the late afternoon of Sunday, 2nd November 2014.

Dinah brought the Halliwick Concept to Wales in July 1973, because she realized that although many of her charges had plenty of exercise and a social life when they were in school, when they left there was nothing and so single handily she helped start almost all of the twenty-seven clubs in Wales, and so for this she was made a Member of the British Empire in 1988.

Dinah will not only be missed by the members of the Welsh Region, because of course she was involved with much more than swimming. Dinah believed passionately in the integration of people with disabilities into sport and to this end she designed a canvas carry seat so that young people could go on camp with the Brownies and the Guides and adult size seats were also made, and used for many years by the swimming Clubs, not only to get people onto the side of the pool, but when they went on bus trips or visited other Clubs. Dinah also helped run the Heath Riding for the Disabled club in Cardiff, because she thought it was a fun way to learn the art of balance.

However Dinah's first love was Guiding, where she was greatly respected and as well as being an Honorary Member of the World Guiding Committee, she was a holder of the Beaver Award, which is the highest honour the Guides can give, but for many years Dinah also ran her own Brownie pack in Cardiff, which was sacrosanct and she very rarely missed any of their meetings.

I owe much to Dinah's help and guidance, especially when I first took over from her as Regional Chairman and although I made my own decisions, Dinah would never criticize me when things went wrong, she just got on and helped me sort out the problem.

In the latter part of her working life Dinah was the Vice Principal of the School of Physiotherapy at the University Hospital of Wales, Heath Park, Cardiff, where she was both feared, and also greatly loved by her students, but before this she had helped with much of the early pioneering work on the treatment of Polio victims.

Dinah understood the people of Wales and so the region was run with strict democratic values, but with Dinah firmly in control, which only worked because of the high regard in which she was held.

I have many memories of Dinah and one in particular was when we were driving to our Club in Newtown, Dinah pointed out the old road in the valley below, telling me how she used to ride along it, on her motorbike when she was visiting her students in the Physiotherapy Unit of the local Hospital. The image of Dinah striding into the department, in full leathers has haunted me for years! I also remember the

numerous times we got lost on our way to visit the various clubs in our area, due mainly to my blind faith in Dinah's navigational skills.

Although Dinah had not been active on the National scene for many years, her input in the early days of Halliwick was tremendous, especially in the field of moving and handling.

Dinah will be greatly missed not only by the members of the Welsh Region of Halliwick Association the Swimming Therapy and the members of the National Executive of the Association, but by the many others whose lives she touched.



Perhaps the best memorial to Dinah we can have is to continue the work she started in Wales, over forty years ago.
